**REPORT/MINUTES FOR JANUARY 17, 2025

- b. Chair DiSanto welcomed attendees and invited introductions.

**II. Old Business**

- a. **Approval of Minutes of August 30, 2024 (Attached as Exhibit A)**
  - i. No objections being made, the minutes were approved without a vote.
- b. **Review of Mission Statement and Officer Roles, CLE Planning Event Checklist (Attached as Exhibit B), and CLE Policy (Attached as Exhibit C)**
  - i. Chair DiSanto presented the mission statement and described the function of the committee and its officers. Chair DiSanto reviewed the CLE Planning Event Checklist and CLE Policy. The CLE Committee will reach out to the chairs and liaisons in March to provide each committee or task force an update regarding status of CLE production to leave sufficient time for CLE planning.
- c. **CLE Committee Website**
  - i. Judicial Chair Delano and Chair DiSanto provided an overview of the highlights of the revamped and reorganized CLE Committee website and gave a virtual tour of the updated webpage and information and forms available.

### **III. Leadership Visit**

- i. Manuel Farach, Section Chair, complimented the Section as a whole on the excellent start with their CLE programming and revenue generation. Chair Farach also discussed the implementation of the CLE Policy. While the goal is to have 4 paid CLEs per year per committee, for those committees that did not get 2 programs completed in the fall, it is best to focus on producing 2 quality programs in the spring. Producing 4 CLE programs during the second half of the bar year potentially sacrifices quality, overcrowds the calendar, and overtaxes the Section's administrative resources.
- ii. Stephanie C. Lieb, Chair Elect, provided guidance regarding the CLE programming expectations for the Labor Day Retreat, and the importance of integrating panels with sponsors and practitioners to provide diversified viewpoints and appropriate substantive depth.

#### **a. Upcoming CLEs and Tentatively Schedule CLEs**

- i. The CLE Calendar is available on the CLE webpage and is updated frequently as programs move through the submission and approval process.

#### **b. Progress Reports of Committees and Task Forces**

- i. Progress reports were provided by the committees by Intellectual Property, Corporations, Business Litigation, Computer Law, Bankruptcy/UCC, and Electronic Discovery.

#### **c. Florida Bar Journal Pipeline**

- i. Daniel Etlinger, First Vice Chair of the CLE Committee, led the discussion on the recently published articles and those currently slated for 2025. The CLE Committee has made a concerted effort to deepen the pipeline, including publishing blurbs, announcing at meetings, and individualized outreach to potentially interested members.
- ii. The Journal's submission deadlines and editing scheduled are published so everyone has a sense of the timelines. In addition, the revamped CLE Committee website has additional information regarding publication guidelines, publication agreements and general article information. It is a great jumping off point for anyone considering a paper submission.

Step 2 – When? (Determine Optimal Date)

- Avoid similar industry events on the same day/week
- Clear date against The Florida Bar master calendar
- Optimal date is at least 70 days from initial contact with Program Administrator

Step 3 – Where? (Identify Venue, Determine Event Technology Needs)

- In-person, virtual, or hybrid?
- Virtual or Hybrid – Use InReachCE, offered in after-market library
- In-person – Identify venues, research pricing, visit potential locations

Step 4 – What? (Establish Goals and Brainstorm Event Topic)

- Review BLSE Policy 5.01
- Identify Topic – Current issues that will enhance an “attorneys’ professional competence and skills.” BLSE Policy 5.01(a)(1).
- Identify speakers
  - “An individual or group qualified by practical or academic experience.” BLSE Policy 5.01(a)(3).
  - Consider BLS Diversity Policy

Step 5 – How? (Establish Goals and Brainstorm Event Topic)

- Complete Course Development Form available on CLE Committee website.

  - Consider what types of CLE credit are available (e.g., technology, ethics, bias elimination)
  - Course Development Form must be completed within one week of securing date
- Upload CLE Material submissions, along with bios and headshots through links available on website. Work with section administrator and committee chair to apply for CLE Accreditation (BLSE Policy 5.02)

**BUSINESS LAW SECTION OF THE FLORIDA BAR**

**CONTINUING LEGAL EDUCATION POLICY**

**Effective July 1, 2024**

The Business Law Section of The Florida Bar (“**BLS**”) serves its members through its substantive committees, subcommittees, and task forces, including Bankruptcy/UCC; Blockchain and Digital Assets; Business Litigation; Computer and Technology Law; Corporations, Securities, and Financial Services; Intellectual Property, eDiscovery, and Rules of Court. One of the BLS’s purposes is to provide a forum for the discussion and exchange of ideas leading to the improvement of the laws relating to the foregoing areas of legal practice. The BLS accomplishes this purpose, in part, by presenting quality continuing legal education (“**CLE**”) programs and course materials for the benefit of BLS members and The Florida Bar as a whole.

Accordingly, the BLS adopts the following Continuing Legal Education policy:

1. ***CLE Committee.*** The BLS Continuing Legal Education Committee (“**CLE Committee**”) supports the substantive committees, standing committees, subcommittees, and task forces in their efforts to provide CLE programs. The CLE Committee serves as a liaison between BLS’s substantive committees, standing committees, subcommittees, and task forces and the BLS Administrator.

2. ***CLE Committee Membership.*** The membership of the CLE Committee is as follows:

- Chair;
- First Vice-Chair;
- Second Vice-Chair;
- Judicial Chair;
- One liaison from each BLS substantive committee, standing committee, subcommittee or task force that produces CLE programing;
- Liaisons from subcommittees and task forces as determined on a case-by-case basis.

3. ***Appointment to the CLE Committee.*** As provided in the BLS Bylaws, the BLS’s Chair-Elect, with the approval and concurrence of the Executive Committee, appoints the chairs and vice chairs of the CLE Committee for the upcoming Bar year.

4. ***Liaisons to the CLE Committee.*** The Chair-Elect of each BLS substantive committee, standing committees, subcommittee or task force that produces CLE programming shall appoint a liaison—preferably the vice-chair or second vice-chair of the substantive committee—to the CLE Committee. Chairs or vice-chairs of BLS subcommittees and task forces may appoint additional liaisons to the CLE Committee.

5. ***Responsibilities of Liaisons.*** Liaisons or their designees must attend the CLE Committee meetings conducted at The Florida Bar’s Winter and Annual Meetings and the BLS’s Labor Day Retreat. The CLE Committee shall update the list of liaisons at least annually and maintain the current list on the CLE Committee’s website.

6. ***Required CLE Programming—Substantive Committees.*** In addition to annual presentations of the Legislative Update, the Judge Michael G. Williamson View from the Florida Bankruptcy Bench, the Federal Securities Institute, and the Intellectual Property Law Symposium, each substantive committee shall coordinate with the CLE Committee to produce and deliver at least four CLE programs each year. Each program shall provide a minimum of one hour of CLE credit.

7. ***Expected CLE Programming—Standing Committees, Subcommittees, and Task Forces.*** All substantive law subcommittees or task forces are expected to coordinate with the CLE Committee to produce and deliver at least one CLE program each year. Each program shall provide a minimum of one hour’s CLE credit. CLE programs may be presented online. For any subcommittee or task force that is covering a specific legislative topic, that subcommittee or task force is only expected to produce and deliver a CLE program after the legislation is signed by the Governor.

8. ***Responsibilities for Developing a CLE Program.*** Substantive committees, standing committees, subcommittees, or task forces that produce CLE programming shall designate a Program Chair and/or Steering Committee (volunteers who assist the Program Chair or other individuals) for each CLE program to be presented. The Program Chair or other designated member of the applicable substantive committee, standing committee, subcommittee, or task force shall be responsible for the following:

- Selecting program title and topics;
- Selecting and confirming speakers;
- Collecting the speakers’ course materials prior to their delivery to The Florida Bar for the purpose of quality control, to eliminate overlaps or errors, to reduce costs to BLS;
- Enforcing deadlines, *e.g.*, for the submission of written program materials;

- Personal attendance at live presentations.

Program Chairs or Steering Committee members may also serve as moderators, and act as discussion leaders during Q&A portions of a program. Additional information regarding the roles and responsibilities of program chairs, other individuals and steering committees can be found in The Florida Bar's Manual for Program Chairs, Steering Committee, and Speakers.

9. ***Coordination with CLE Committee.*** Shortly after selection of the theme and topics of the CLE program, the Program Chair or other designated individual shall contact the Chair of the CLE Committee to facilitate the scheduling and marketing of the CLE program with the BLS Administrator. The CLE Committee Chair (or designated vice-chair) and the BLS Administrator will assist the Program Chair, Steering Committee, or other designated individual to

- Determine the optimal date of the CLE program;
- Determine the CLE program type, i.e., Joint Sponsored CLE, Section Sponsored CLE, or Section Service Program;
- Ensure that the program complies with all board of legal specialization and education (“BLSE”) policies;
- Apply for CLE accreditation from the BLSE;
- Develop a marketing plan for the CLE program.

10. ***BLS Administrator.*** The BLS administrator facilitates the scheduling, presentation, and marketing of each CLE program.

11. ***Joint Sponsored CLE Programs.*** Joint Sponsored CLE Programs are jointly sponsored with The Florida Bar's Continuing Legal Education Committee. Joint Sponsored CLE Programs offer a full range of aftermarket sales options and must comply with CLE Committee Requirements. Attendees are required to pay for BLS Sponsored CLE Programs. Income (or loss) from a Joint Sponsored CLE Program is shared on an 80/20 split between the BLS and The Florida Bar.

12. ***Section Sponsored CLE Programs.*** Section Sponsored CLE Programs are not jointly sponsored with The Florida Bar CLE Committee. Aftermarket sales of Section Sponsored CLE Programs are limited to CDs, DVDs, and books. Section Sponsored CLE Programs are NOT available for purchase as online or downloadable products on The Florida Bar's 24/7 Online & Downloadable CLE Catalog. Attendees are required to pay

for BLS Sponsored CLE Programs. Income from BLS Sponsored CLE Programs belongs to the BLS and all expenses are the BLS's responsibility.

13. ***Section Service Programs.*** Section Service Programs are considered a service to BLS members and not necessarily for the purpose of generating revenue in excess of the cost of producing the program. Examples include CLE programs that are presented during Substantive Committee meetings at BLS meetings and programs covering mental health and wellness topics. Section Service Programs are limited to BLS members only (or may be provided to a non-member when that non-member joins the BLS). Section Service Programs and must be presented in a single session and may not be made available for aftermarket sales of any kind. However, Section Service Programs may be recorded and offered at no charge.

## **FLORIDA BAR BUSINESS LAW SECTION- CLE COMMITTEE**

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### **Mission Statement**

The CLE Committee supports the substantive committees of the Business Law Section in their efforts to provide continuing legal education programs and articles for The Florida Bar Journal. The CLE Committee serves as a liaison between the substantive committees, their designated representatives, and the Business Law Section Administrator to facilitate the scheduling and marketing of CLE programs and provides editorial oversight for Bar Journal articles.

### **Officer Roles/ Responsibilities**

- Chair:
  - Serves as the primary point of contact for CLE Committee with third parties and coordinates communication with other BLS Committees and BLS leadership
  - Schedules officer and committee meeting as needed to supplement the meetings held during The Florida Bar and BLS conferences
  - Communicates as needed with CLE Committee members between meetings
  - Ensures that all appropriate matters come before the CLE Committee at committee meetings
  - Coordinates the CLE Committee's efforts with respect to BLS members' submissions of articles for publication in The Florida Bar Journal
  - Represents the CLE Committee and reports on its activities at all BLS Executive Council meetings, or arranges for substitute representation if the Chair is unable to attend
  
- Vice-Chair:
  - Assists the Chair in fulfilling his or her responsibilities
  - Encourages and coordinates the participation of substantive BLS Committees in CLE Committee meetings
  - Takes minutes of all meetings and circulates the minutes to Committee officers
  - Drafts a written report to the Executive Council summarizing the CLE Committee meetings in advance of Executive Council meetings
  - Serves as the Chair at any Committee meeting that the Chair is unable to attend
  
- Second Vice-Chair:
  - Assists the chair and second vice chair in fulfilling their responsibilities
  - Provides continuity for CLE Committee leadership
  
- Judicial Chair:
  - Supports the efforts of the Chair, Vice-Chair, and Second Vice-Chair
  - Provides continuity as new BLS members assume leadership positions in the CLE Committee

## **BUSINESS LAW SECTION DIVERSITY EQUITY AND INCLUSION CLE POLICY**

Adopted by The Business Law Section of The Florida Bar on June , 2022

The Business Law Section (“BLS”) supports proactive measures to ensure that individuals from all backgrounds are afforded fair opportunities to participate in CLE programs. All CLE programs sponsored or co-sponsored by the BLS will meet the objectives of the BLS Diversity Committee Strategic Plan to eliminate bias and enhance diversity.

Program organizers will invite and include prospective moderators and faculty members to create CLE panels that meet the objectives of the BLS Diversity Committee Strategic Plan. This includes, among others, moderators, and faculty members from historically underrepresented communities (e.g., racial and ethnic demographic groups/people of color, women, persons with disabilities, and LGBTQ+ individuals).

The Inclusion, Mentoring and Fellowship Committee (“IMF”) will create a subcommittee (the “DEI Subcommittee”), which shall be chaired by the Vice Chair of the IMF Committee and may include representatives from any other BLS committees, subcommittees, task forces and other entities (“BLS Entities”). The DEI Subcommittee shall monitor the BLS’s CLE programming to ensure that BLS Entities conduct CLE programs in accordance with this policy. The DEI Subcommittee will have authority to engage and assist any BLS Entities found not to be in compliance with this policy. Final decisions with respect to BLS Entities conducting CLE programs in accordance with this policy shall rest with the BLS Executive Committee. IMF shall report the DEI Subcommittee’s findings at regularly scheduled meetings of the Executive Council.

The implementation date for this Diversity Equity and Inclusion CLE Policy shall be July 1 , 2022.
